He gained his Ph.D. from the University of Vienna (1984), was a visiting graduate student at the University of Rochester (1983/83), Assistant and Lecturer at the political science department, University of Salzburg (1985-1997), visiting research fellow at the Centre of European Studies, Harvard University (1989/90), Visiting research fellow at MIT's program in Science, Technology, and Society (1992/93), assistant professor at the Department of Science and Technology Studies, Cornell University (1993-95), visiting professor, Department of Social Studies, Hong Kong University of Science and Technology (1997) and at The Australian School of Environmental Studies, Griffith University, Brisbane, Australia (2004). Gottweis' research focuses on comparative public policy. He has studied a number of policy fields, such as environmental policy, energy policy, genetic engineering policy, health and biomedicine policy, and the BSE crisis. Gottweis has a strong theoretical and methodological interest in policy research and links in his work theoretical oriented questions with his interest in addressing concrete problems of contemporary policy making and governance. He has directed many research projects. His research group at the political science department currently focuses on global biotechnology policy, participatory governance, narrative policy analysis, and health governance.
